Perennial Personalities: Year-Round Garden Stars

Perennials are the dependable stars of any garden—resilient, reliable, and always ready to shine. Like favorite neighborhood characters, each one has a personality all its own.

Once planted and rooted, perennials can live for several years, providing your garden with color and ground cover year after year.

When planting, match personalities, consider height, bloom time, and texture, and create a cast that feels lively all year long. Rocks, boulders, and desert companions help set the scene, making your garden look natural, yet perfectly choreographed.

Steadfast, charming, and endlessly intriguing, perennials prove that personality and resilience can coexist. They're the unsung stars of the garden.



ATTRACT & REPEL

Adding plants that attract **pollinators** such as bees, butterflies, and hummingbirds, will set the stage for fun nature watching and support declining pollinator populations. Pollinators sustain flowering plants and fuel the robust agricultural economy in the Coachella Valley. Providing a diverse plant habitat is the most significant action you can take to support the health of our local ecosystem.

5 Tips to Create a Pollinator-Friendly Garden

1. **Grow native flowering plants:** Native plants are ideal for local pollinators, thriving in local soils and climates with minimal water, no fertilizers, and low risk of becoming invasive.
2. **Plant in the sun:** Pollinator-friendly plants should receive full sun throughout most of the day.
3. **Provide long-lasting blooms:** To support pollinators year-round, plant a mix of flowers that bloom at different times to provide continuous nectar and pollen.
4. **Plant in groups:** Clumps of flowering plants will attract more pollinators than single plants scattered in a landscape.
5. **No insecticides:** Insecticides have the potential to poison or kill pollinators.

Tips to Save Water

Most of the water used in the Coachella Valley is applied outdoors. Do what you can in the yard to stop water waste.

- Reduce watering in your landscape by **two days** per week during winter months.
- Water your lawn in the **early morning** or **evening** when temperatures are cooler and there is less wind.
- Divide your irrigation time into **multiple periods** per day for better soil absorption.
- Check **sprinkler heads** to make sure they are spraying properly.
- Eliminate water **runoff** onto streets and sidewalks.
- Let your lawn **go golden** during the fall and winter. You can keep Bermuda grass alive in a dormant condition with only occasional watering.
- Replace your lawn with **desert-friendly** landscape.
- Install a **smart controller** and let it adjust your irrigation automatically every month.

New Year, New Scent

Cool colors and an herbal scent bring a calm and fresh start to the new year. Can be grown in full sun as the most heat-tolerant variety of lavender but tolerates afternoon shade. Tiny dark purple flowers grow on spikes with bracts that resemble rabbit ears atop its mounding foliage. Prune after its last bloom, for an attractive, fragrant plant year-round.



Star 02 Flower

Pentas lanceolata ✨

Life of the Party

This showy, frost-tender plant makes a bold statement. It's vibrant, small, star-shaped flowers grow in 4-inch clusters, which can be admired in the garden or indoors as cut flowers in vases. It also adds dazzling color and nonstop energy to garden containers, borders and beds, while bringing a blooming party to your garden year-round.

Gardening Tips

- Fertilize deciduous and citrus fruit trees with a complete slow-release fertilizer
- Plant shallow-rooted groundcovers, native plants, and other low-water use plants
- Check plants for aphids - control with insecticidal soap
- Prune citrus trees lightly, keeping the canopy skirt 1' above the ground
- Begin deep watering trees

Gardening Tips

- Plant water-saving perennials so they can establish before summer heat arrives
- Prune frost-damaged trees and shrubs
- Thin crowded fall-planted annuals
- Check plants for aphids - control with insecticidal soap
- Reset irrigation systems to meet increased water needs. Consider installing a smart controller

Chocolate 04 Flower

Berlandiera lyrata

Smells Like Dessert

The rich, sweet scent of the chocolate flower lives up to its name. Its sunny yellow daisy blooms with maroon centers release a chocolate-like fragrance. Flowerheads expand in the morning but droop in the afternoon to conserve energy. Remove old flower heads to extend the blooming period.



Tasman 05 Flax Lily

Dianella tasmanica

Quiet Sophistication

Grasslike perennial with strap-shaped leaves grow in clumps. Blue flowers and berries add subtle elegance. The 'variegata' version of this plant has bold white stripes, adding brightness to shady corners in the garden. This compact perennial thrives with partial shade and adapts to a variety of soil, ideal for a refined desert garden.

Gardening Tips

- Water trees deeply
- Apply organic mulches beneath the root areas of citrus, roses and perennials
- Pick rapidly growing weeds
- If chlorosis shows on trees, treat with soil acidifiers
- Remove spent yucca and aloe flower stalks once they are past their bloom
- Evaluate your irrigation system to avoid water waste issues

A compact version of 'Indigo Spires,' which grows much larger. This durable, yet elegant perennial was first discovered by chance as hybrid seeding at the Huntington Botanical Gardens in the 1970s. It's a perfect colorful addition to beds, borders, or containers.

Gardening Tips

- Prune to control rampant growth of oleander, citrus, lantana, bougainvillea, and hibiscus
- Remove dead and crossing tree branches
- Water trees deeply but infrequently
- Plant and transplant palms, cacti, mesquites, and palo verde
- If applying fertilizer, wet the soil the day before and immediately after application

Let this perennial light up your desert landscape. Its bold red tubular flowers add the perfect spark to its green stems. These fiery blooms thrive in rocky terrain and double as erosion control. Occasionally reblooms after summer monsoons.

Gardening Tips

- Increase watering to about twice the amount being used in the winter
- Solarize your fall vegetables to kill soil-borne diseases and weed seeds — use clear plastic over deeply wetted soil
- Regularly remove weeds
- Avoid heavy pruning or use of fertilizer
- Plant seeds in the last two weeks of July for beans, corn, pumpkins, winter squash, and sunflowers

- Remove spent flowers and trim dead flowering stems and foliage from perennials
- Prep soil for fall with organic materials from compost, manure, or store-bought soil amendment
- Consider turf removal instead of overseeding this fall

Like a garden surprise, star-shaped blooms appear after summer rains. Compact and charming, it's an ideal addition to containers, walkways, or borders, creating a desert magic show after the rain. Evergreen, upright green foliage resembles grass but starts to yellow when blooming finishes.

Remove dead leaves to allow them to provide nutrients for next year's growth.

- Fertilize citrus trees the first two weeks of the month
- Plant a winter vegetable garden of leafy greens, root crops and cool-season herbs
- Avoid pruning that could cause sunburn
- Prepare fall planting beds — dig organic materials into top 8" to 10" of soil

Orange, pink, red, or lavender — take your pick of this fuzzy-leaved perennial that brings desert landscapes to life. Perfect for butterfly gardens. Globe Mallow is low-water, low-maintenance, and endlessly cheerful. Great to look at, but be careful with handling, as it can irritate the eyes and skin.





Purple 11 Coneflower

Echinacea purpurea

The Desert Standout

Bold, resilient, and impossible to ignore. Thrives in full sun and is low maintenance. Each tall stem carries a striking flower with purple petals surrounding a dark cone center. The spiky dark center matures into seeds for birds. Perfect for adding reliable color and long-lasting charm to your garden.

Gardening Tips

- Continue fall planting
- Cut perennials back to basal growth and clean up leaf debris after bloom cycle completes
- Extend watering interval for citrus trees but continue to water deeply
- Move cold-tender plants in containers under a shelter to protect from cold temperatures
- Plant vegetable seed crops for winter, spring harvests

This resilient perennial thrives in natural gardens, especially among wildflowers. Overwatering can lead to root rot. Pollinators can't resist its golden charm.
